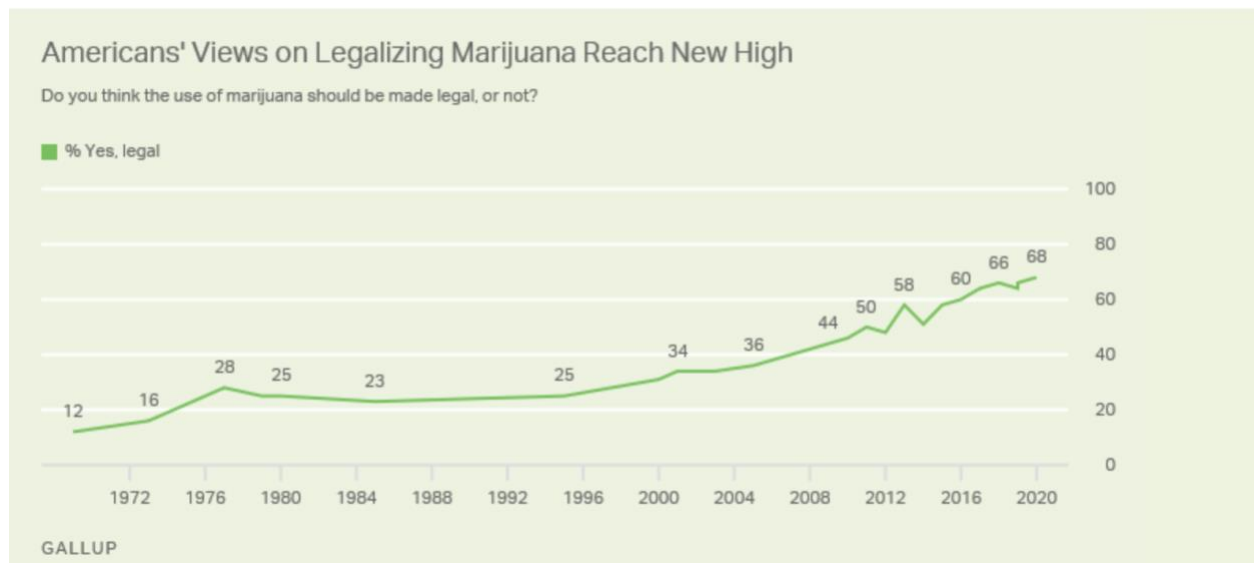




## *Polls Show Overwhelming Support for Legalizing Cannabis*

The public is far ahead of most elected officials in support of marijuana policy reform. A supermajority of Americans support making marijuana legal. Support isn't limited to specific states, ages, parties, or regions. Gallup found majority or plurality support among all age ranges, while the polling firm Civiq found majority support in every state for making marijuana legal. Yet only 19 U.S. states have legalized marijuana.

- National polls, including by Pew Research Center, Gallup, and CNN, show that most Americans support legalization. In October 2020, Gallup found that 68% of Americans support “making marijuana use legal” — more than double the level of support in 2000.



- There is solid, bipartisan support. In 2020, Gallup found 83% support for legalization among Democrats, 72% support from independents, and 48% support from Republicans.
- Gallup's 2020 poll also found that no age group opposed legalization, reporting 55% support among those 65+, 60% support from persons 50-64, 75% support from individuals aged 30-49, and 79% support from those 18-29 years old.
- Since 2017, the public research firm Civiq has surveyed more than 185,000 registered voters on legalization. As of June 2021, it found 70% support nationwide and majority support in every state, ranging from 52% in North Dakota to 81% in Washington.
- Voters in states that have implemented legalization overwhelmingly view the laws as successful or as more of a success than a failure. April 2020 YouGov surveys found 56% to 69% of voters in California, Colorado, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, Oregon, and Washington viewed their state's legalization laws as mostly or entirely successful. In Maine — where legal sales have not begun — a plurality of 47% viewed it as a success. (Alaska and Vermont also have legalization laws, but YouGov did not have sufficient sample sizes to show results.) In each state, no more than 20% of voters viewed the law as more of a failure than a success.
- Polls indicate voters' support for keeping marijuana use legal increased after legalization. In all 11 legalization states where sales have begun, Civiq found support for legalization at 70% or

higher. From the oldest to newest laws, it found 76% support in Colorado, 81% in Washington, 73% in Alaska, 80% in Oregon, 78% in California, 77% in Nevada, 77% in Massachusetts, 74% in Maine, 74% in Illinois, 71% in Michigan, and 70% in Arizona. In each state that legalized cannabis by initiative, support was far higher than what the initiative received. In the two states where legislatures enacted the laws — Illinois and Vermont — support was well above polls conducted before passage.
